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INTRODUCTION TO LENT

Lent comes from an Old English word which means “to lengthen.” It’s a reference to the time of year as spring approaches and the days grow longer. Just as the light shines longer and plant life is renewed, so also is it time for the Christian to focus on our Light, Christ, and to be renewed spiritually.

Lent is a period of 40 days, not counting Sundays, between Ash Wednesday and Easter. There are five Sundays of Lent, which are celebrated as mini-Easters, leading up to Holy Week. Holy Week opens with Palm Sunday and is capped with the Triduum: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter.

LENT & FASTING

Lent is a 40 day period (excluding Sundays) between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Historically, Lent was marked as a period of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. In the early Christian church, celebration of Easter began with 40 hours of fasting. However, sometime after AD 325 this period of fasting was expanded to 40 days. The number 40 is not an arbitrary choice. 40 frequently appears in Scripture: the flood from which God saved Noah and his family lasted 40 days (Genesis 7:4, 12, 17) and the Israelites wandered in the wilderness for 40 years (Exodus 16:35). Furthermore, Moses fasted two different times for 40 days. Once he fasted when he was on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:28) and then again after the Israelites created the golden calf (Deuteronomy 9:18). Jesus too, fasted for 40 days when he was tempted in the wilderness (Matthew 4:2).

In the present day, Lent is known less as a time of fasting and more as a time of giving something up—like sweets or Netflix. Whether you take time to fast or give something up, Lent certainly is about giving something up. But if Lent is just about giving up food, chocolate, or alcohol then Lent is a shallow exercise.

Certainly giving up some external things can prove to be beneficial. Giving up these external things helps us focus on internal things. Things like the inclination of our hearts. Things like our secret thoughts and attitudes which often manifest themselves in words and actions. These are the things which God wants us to give up.

After committing adultery with Bathsheba and killing her husband as a cover up, King David wrote Psalm 51. In this Psalm he confronted the internal things in his heart which manifested themselves as external actions. Praying to God he wrote, “Yet you desired faithfulness even in the womb” (Psalm 51:6). God wants us to give up sin because he demands faithfulness. He demands perfection from us. But that’s the problem, isn’t it? We aren’t faithful. We aren’t perfect. Not even deep down inside.

Later in the Psalm David wrote, “My sacrifice, O God, is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart you, God, will not despise” (Psalm 51:17). God will not despise a broken heart. He will not despise a contrite spirit. If there is anything we can give up to God it is our sin, and more than just behavior modification we can give up our guilt.

As much as Lent is about giving up as it is more so about returning to God.

If we just remain in a pit of contrition and repentance that will do no good. Contrition and repentance without listening to God's promise is just one more way that our sinful nature likes to pile up some good works which make us feel better.

The Prophet Joel called on the nation of Israel to fast, but for one particular purpose—to return to the Lord. “Even now,” declares the Lord, “return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning” (Joel 2:12). The fast was meant to allow the people to take time to focus on their own hearts. The fast was meant to prompt them to return to God.

They could return to God with confidence of what they would receive from him. They would not receive what the people would deserve rather, as Joel said, “Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity.”

That is God's eternal promise in the season of Lent. Lent is a time to remind ourselves of why we need to return to God. We need to return precisely because he is gracious, compassionate, slow to anger, and abounding in love. He does not deal with us as our sins deserve. Instead, he dealt with his only Son as our sins deserve.

These are the days of the church year that our Savior draws ever closer to his cross. As he draws closer to the cross, he draws closer to winning us our salvation. On the cross is where God placed our sin. On the cross is where God placed our guilt. On the cross Christ faced the calamity of the guilt of our sin. And our sins and guilt died with Christ there. Because our guilt died on Golgotha we have the promise of grace and compassion from our God.

Lent is a time of both giving up and return. It is a time to focus on our hearts and turn our sin over to God, but it is also a time to return to him as our gracious and compassionate God.

A TIME OF REPENTANCE

Repentance is not just feeling sorry from sin and beating yourself up for your missteps. Repentance leads us to a longing for the salvation of our God. The concept of repentance has two main parts. First is sorrow over sin because our consciences have been terrorized by the realization of sin. Second is faith which clings to the promise that in Christ our sins are forgiven and so the terrors of conscience are silenced.

In order to gain further clarity it may be helpful to further break down these two main parts. Repentance may practically look like this:

CONTRITION

1. Acknowledge sin.

2. Confess sin to God.



FAITH

3. Trust in God's forgiveness

4. Make a 180 degree turn from sin.

HOW TO USE THIS PLAN

The reading guide begins on Ash Wednesday and is intended to help guide you through the subsequent weeks of Lent. Each week (including the half week of Ash Wednesday) includes a primary reading from one of the Gospels, two supplementary readings, a song to listen to, as well as a prayer.

Begin your readings on Monday of each week. Read through the provided Gospel passage and begin to consider the passage as it pertains to your life. Use the passage to guide your prayers. On the opposite page of each passage is space for you to journal thoughts and prayers or to just jot down notes. As you consider each reading ask yourself the following questions:

1. What does this teach me... about God, about our sin, about salvation?
2. What does this show me about God for which I can praise him?
3. What does this show me about myself for which I can repent?
4. What does this lead me to pray?

A model plan for each week might look like this:

MONDAY

Gospel reading. Journal thoughts as you read. Listen to song. Condense down to one main take away. Read the prayer. Consider the takeaway throughout your day.

TUESDAY

First supplementary reading. Journal thoughts as you read. Listen to song. Condense down to one main take away. Reread the prayer. Consider the takeaway throughout your day.

WEDNESDAY

Second supplementary reading. Journal thoughts as you read. Listen to song. Condense thoughts down to one main take away. Reread prayer. Consider the takeaway throughout your day. Turn thoughts into a prayer.

THURSDAY

Third supplementary reading. Journal thoughts as you read. Listen to song. Condense thoughts down to one main take away. Reread prayer. Consider the takeaway throughout your day. Turn thoughts into a prayer.

FRIDAY

Reread your notes from the supplementary readings. Consider again the main take aways. Turn your thoughts into your own prayer.

LUKE 18:9-14

JOHN 2:13-25

When it was almost time for the Jewish Passover, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴ In the temple courts he found people selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money. ¹⁵ So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple courts, both sheep and cattle; he scattered the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ To those who sold doves he said, “Get these out of here! Stop turning my Father’s house into a market!” ¹⁷ His disciples remembered that it is written: “Zeal for your house will consume me.”

¹⁸ The Jews then responded to him, “What sign can you show us to prove your authority to do all this?”

JOHN 4:1-26

Now Jesus learned that the Pharisees had heard that he was gaining and baptizing more disciples than John—² although in fact it was not Jesus who baptized, but his disciples. ³ So he left Judea and went back once more to Galilee.

⁴ Now he had to go through Samaria. ⁵ So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph. ⁶ Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired as he was from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about noon.

⁷ When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, "Will you give me a drink?" ⁸ (His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.)

⁹ The Samaritan woman said to him, "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?" (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

¹⁰ Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water."

LUKE 19:28-40
